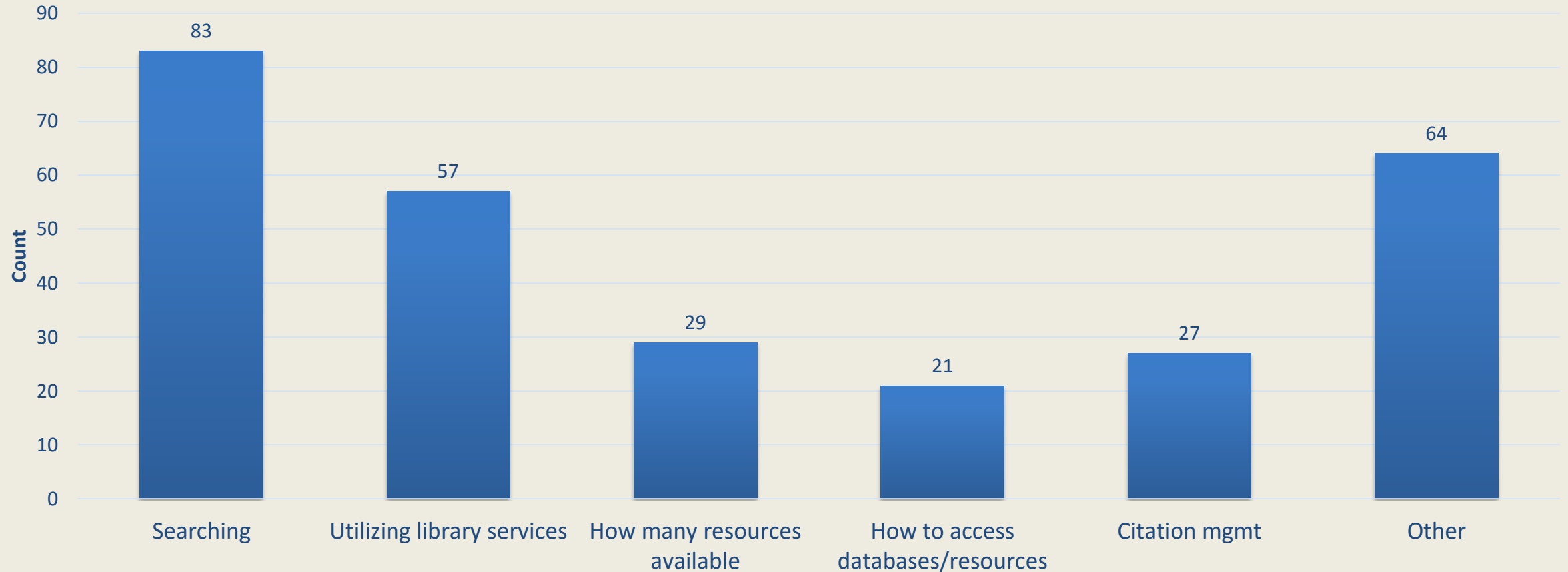

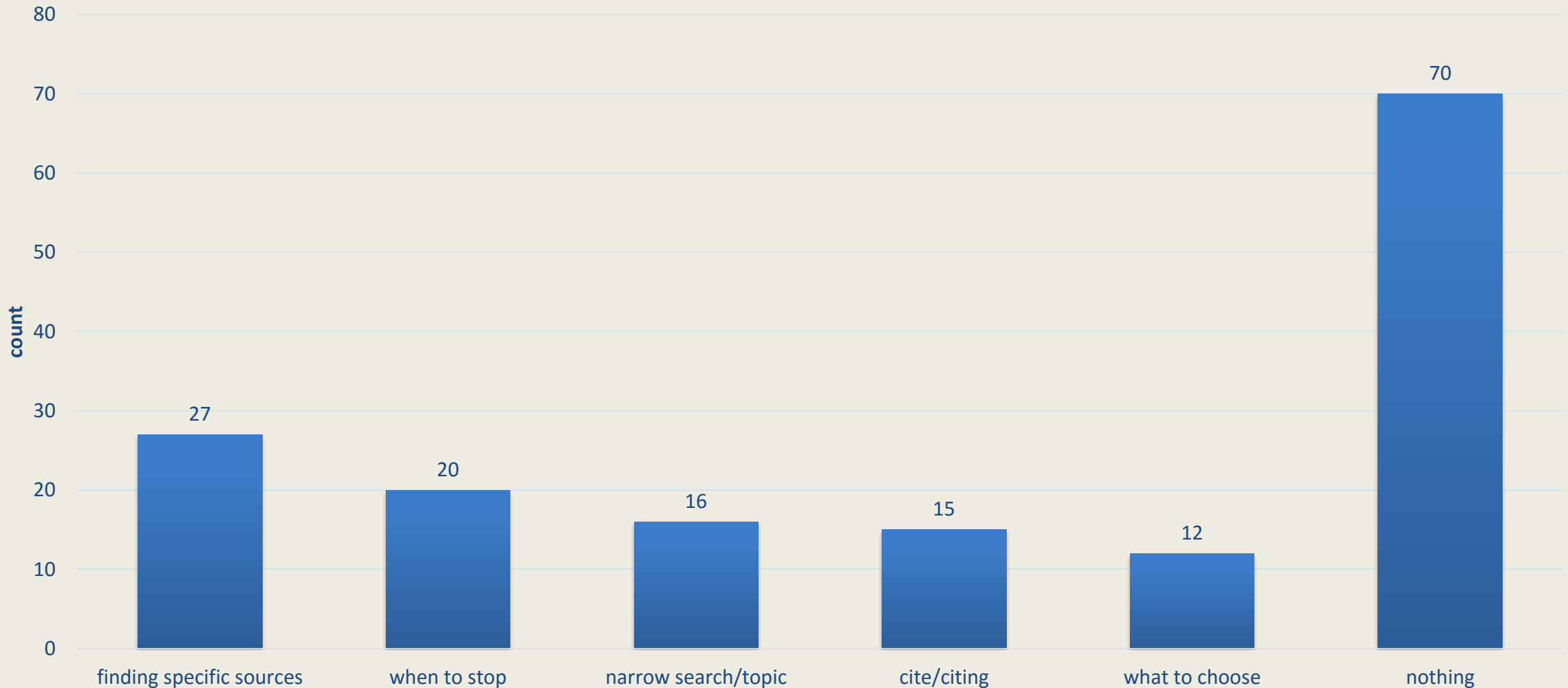
1. What's one new thing you learned today? (partial list)

- **Search**
 - How to use different databases to perform research
 - How to search for a law topic by index instead of by keyword.
 - Using advanced search
- **Utilizing Library services**
 - The mechanics of Borrow Direct
 - I learned how to use the library's "Borrow Direct" service and many other services that are available for finding resources when it is not currently available at a specific library.

 - Using Zotero to saving articles.

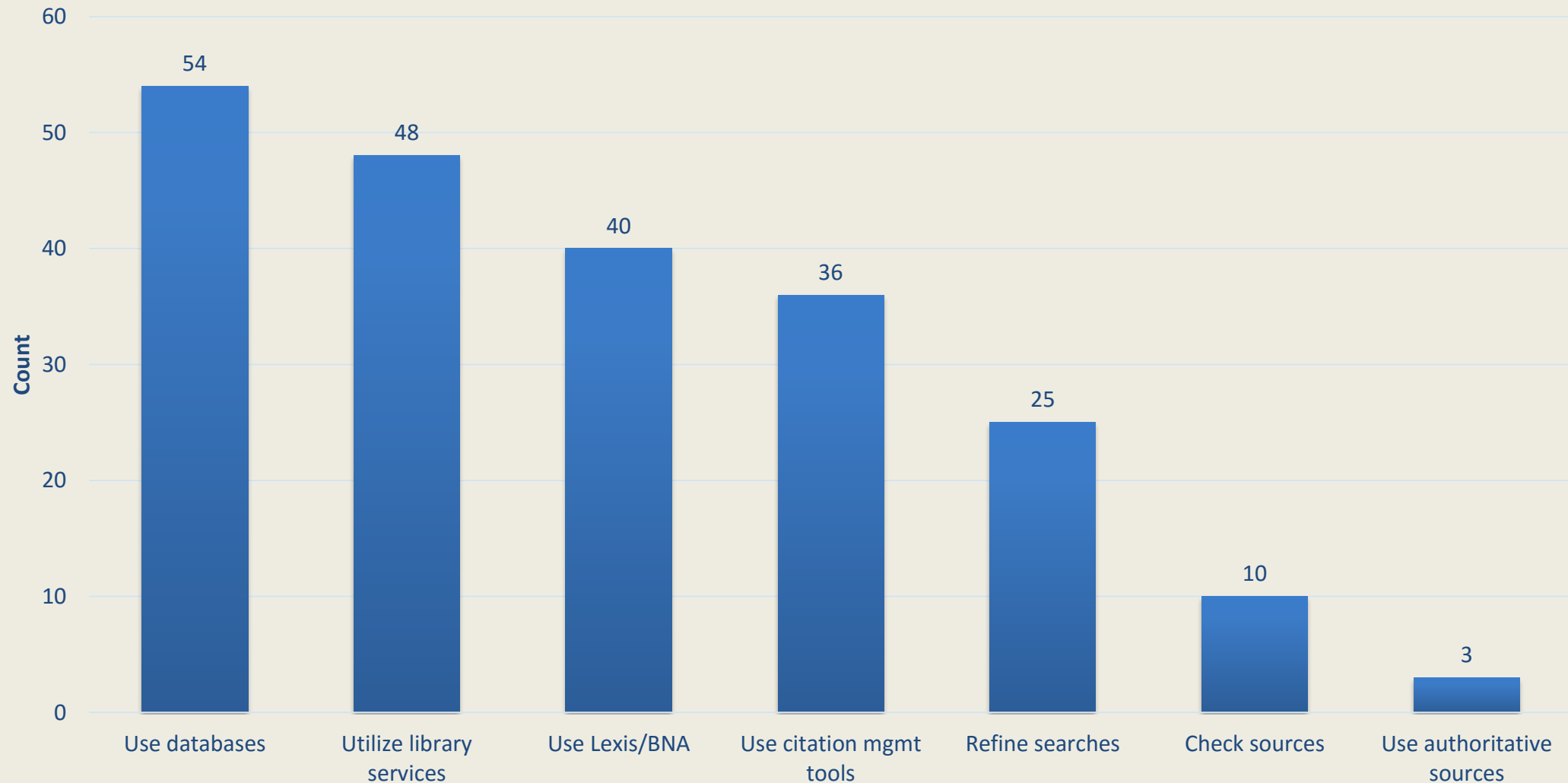
2. What is still confusing about doing research for this assignment?

3. What's one thing you'll do differently in your research based on / what you learned today?

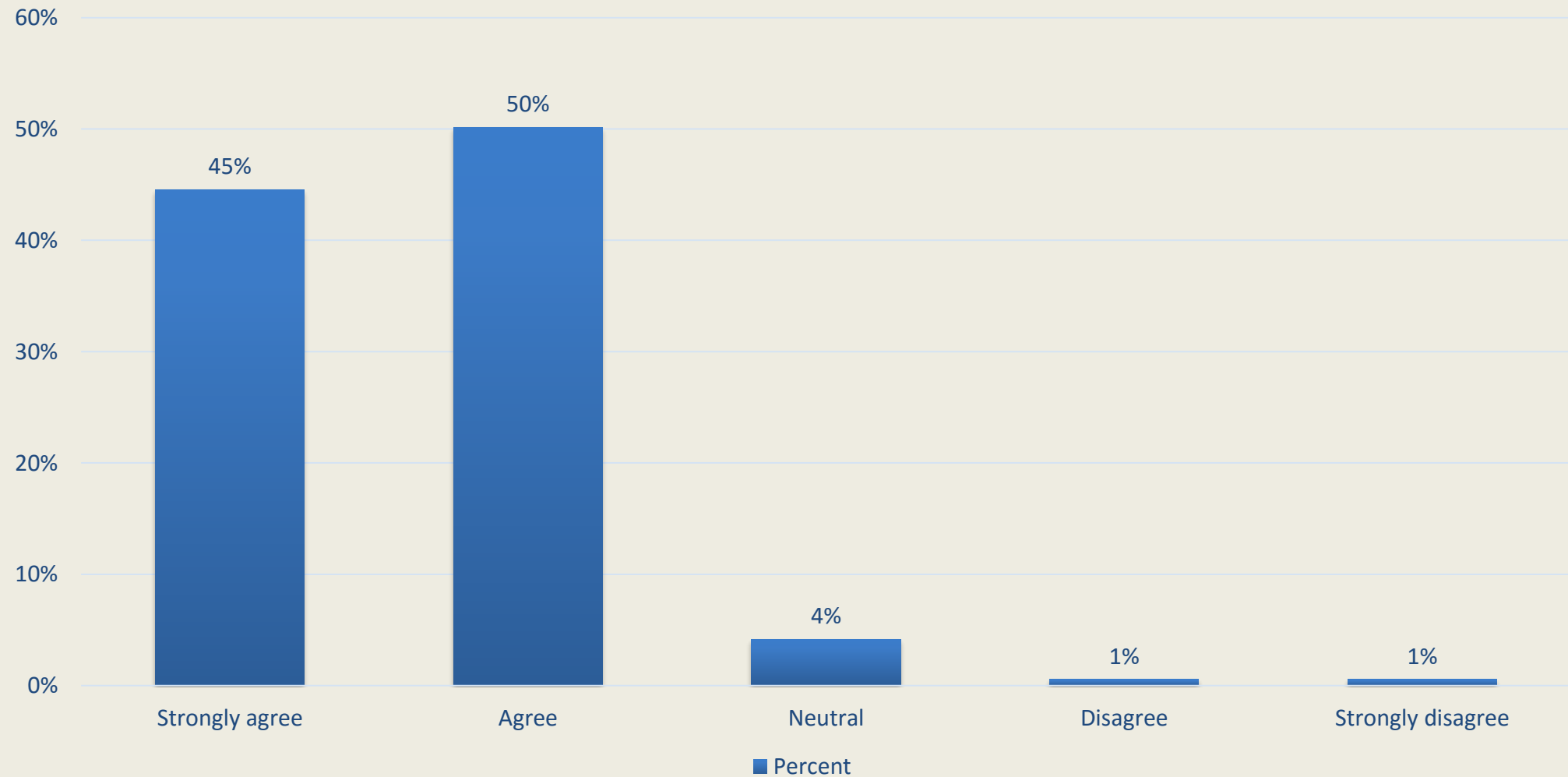

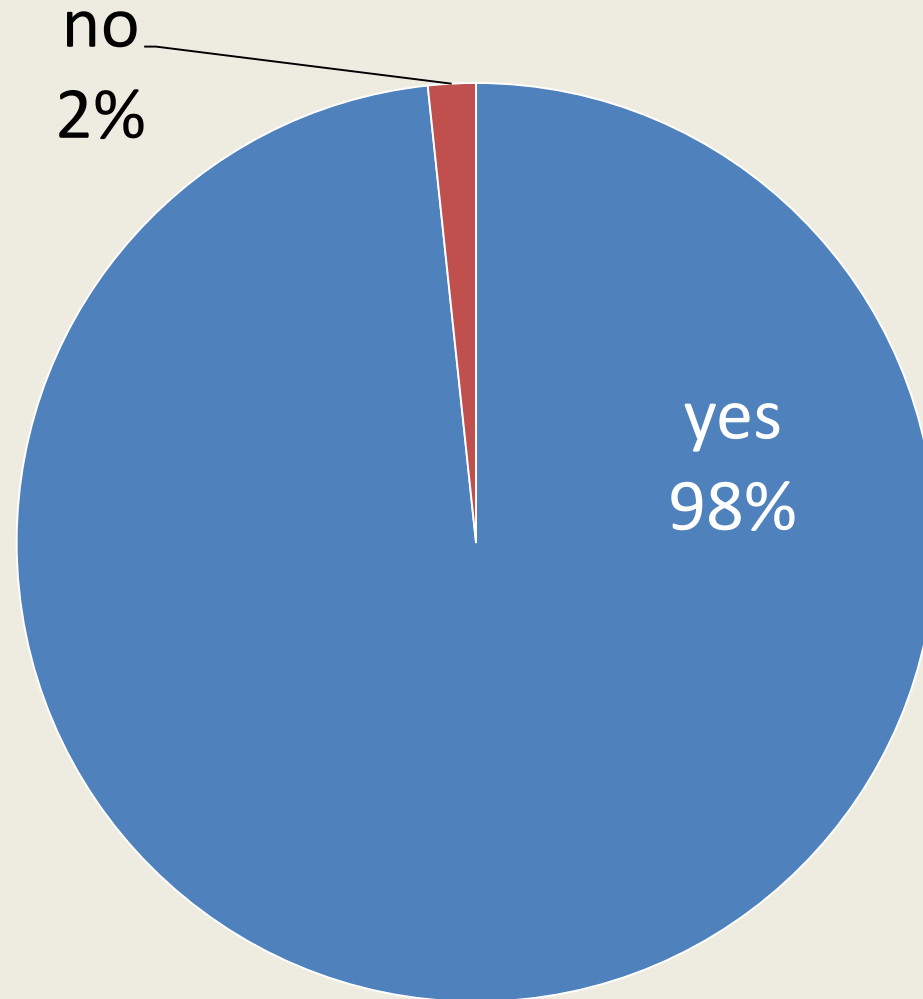
One thing they will do differently.....

5. Was this library instruction session helpful?



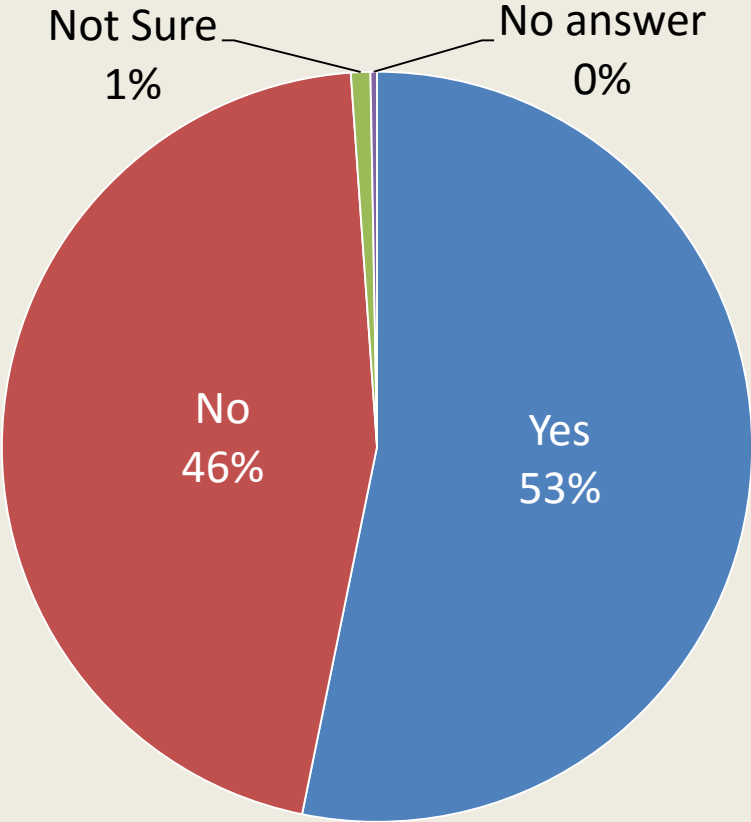
YES, helpful because (in their own words)....

- I felt like I knew almost everything covered
- I think that in future you should do this session when the students already have their assignment prompt or do a practice prompt from prior years. I'd also like to know how the LexisNexis research tangibly translates to what we're supposed to do. Our professor said that the prompt is different than a traditional paper so I think it's crucial that we research with something as close to that as possible.
