## Portal Update

Camille Andrews, Maureen Morris and Neely Tang joined to provide a Portal update. The portal uptake form is experiencing some activity. So far, one faculty member has expressed interest in the Myanmar Portal and will serve as a good test case. Generally uptick is expected to happen after the Portal is seen in action. Once the portal has been tested, there will be opportunities for library staff to visit and VIP sessions (faculty and media will be invited). Gerald commented that after the 3-month pilot, we'll examine doing it again.

### **SHARES Onsite Borrowing**

Caitlin Finlay joined to provide information on the new SHARES on-site borrowing program:

- This will be similar to the current Borrow Direct program
- Currently, the Shares participating program allows only for on-site access without borrowing privileges. This will now be different because patrons will be able to check out books.
- The plan is to initially get 10 participating libraries in the program and possibly expand in the future
- Estimated timeline for deployment is August/September 2018
