The webinar team of Mary Ochs, Greg Green, Alison Shea and Jim Morris-Knower is working with Xin Li and Gerald Beasley to plan the next webinar in December, but the date is not set yet. The December webinar will be hosted in collaboration with IFLA and focus on how libraries in the developing world are supporting sustainability research.
