arXiv Partnership Evaluation Rubric

To distinguish partnerships from simple transactional relationships, we define partnerships as having the following characteristics. A partnership: 1

- requires seed funding from one or more partners, or an external source, and/or dedicated staff time;
- provides mutual benefits to all partners;
- requires shared risks and responsibilities for all partners, and
- · results in measurable outcomes.

Partnership evaluation questions¹

- 1. Provide a brief, high-level description of the partnership (context for the questions that follow).
- 2. General questions
 - a. Why do we wish to engage with this particular partner (or why is this a good potential partner)?
 - b. What type of organization is the partner organization (e.g. nonprofit, for-profit)? Is it mission-driven?
 - c. Describe the organization's history, track record, and standing in its community.
 - d. How does the partnership advance arXiv's priorities?
 - e. What are the potential opportunity costs?
 - f. Why do they want to engage with us?
 - g. Do the partners share a vision, and if they do, what is it?
 - h. What evidence is there of commitment to the success of this partnership?
 - i. What are the potential benefits to arXiv and to the partner?
 - j. What are the potential risks to arXiv and to the partner?
 - k. What are the partners' tolerance for risk?
 - I. Is there a reasonable exit strategy (explain)?
 - m. Note any other considerations/concerns.
- 3. Governance, decision-making
 - a. How will governance be handled?
 - b. How will priorities be set?
 - c. How will decisions be made?
 - d. How will IP be managed between the partners?
 - e. What considerations or requirements might constrain or impact our ability to collaborate on grant proposals? What will the roles of the partners be?
 - f. Note any other considerations/concerns.
- 4. Resources
 - a. What arXiv and partner resources are required to start and sustain the partnership?
 - b. What are the partners willing to contribute?
 - c. What costs will be incurred and how will they be distributed between the partners?
 - d. Note any other considerations/concerns.
- 5. Software development process
 - a. How will the work get done? Co-development, parallel, etc.
 - b. What development practices will be employed?
 - c. Note any other considerations/concerns.
